Acik Kapi Church is doing great and we're feeling blessed! We could probably continue on as a church like we are for decades. But that isn't what we want. We are a group of mostly foreigners coming together to worship. But we are called to be salt and light in our community. Most of us live in the community where the church is. We've spent the last couple of months getting set up, organized and forming into a community. But we've got to get out of our walls and into the community.

We have a number of plans to do this; English club, art events, Christmas festivities, online outreach, etc. However, my experience is that the greatest outreach happens when we spend time in prayer and then God shows us what He's been up to the whole time. I've seen this sort of thing happen a number of times in our years here and it's always an amazing experience. I've noticed that these opportunities usually coincide with people tell me that they've been praying for us. If 3 people tell me in a week that they've been praying, I usually expect to see God at work in special ways the coming week.

So, could you spend some time praying for God to open up opportunities for us to discover relationships in our community. There are three neighborhoods right around us. One is called Cayyolu (Chai-yolu), the second is called Dr. Ahmet Tanner Kislalasi (just call it "Dr. Ahmet neighborhood":) and the third is Koru neighborhood. Could you pray for us to find ways to love these neighborhoods and meet people to share Jesus with? *Thanks! From Paul Prayers and Thoughts:* Pray for Nick Butcher and family as they minister to us here in Ladoga.

Pray for the Leonards and their work in Turkey. Pray for our shut-ins. Remember all our mothers and fathers. Remember our Military the mothers, fathers and families. Pray for our church and leadership.
